Multilateral institutions such as the International Monetary Fund, the World Bank or the GATT (later the World Trade Organization) were the cornerstones of the economic order since the end of the Second World War. They carried liberal ideas of open trade and finance, and played a central role in inducing states to adopt neoliberal economic policies and open their national economies to foreign trade and capital.

This order has been widely criticized for decades. Since the fall of the system of coordinated exchange rates, financial crises have occurred every decade, poverty and infrastructure gaps in developing countries still persist. In addition, power shifts towards China and newly emerging markets and the "America First" policy of the Trump administration weaken international institutions by questioning traditional liberal values and the distribution of power in multilateral institutions.

Against this background this workshop will explore the relationship between global and regional economic institutions as possible cornerstones of a new international order. Regional arrangements in Latin America, Asia, Africa and Europe have developed after the Second World War and increasingly during the last 20 years, in response to the stalling multilateral trade regime and to several financial crises. The workshop brings together an international group of academic experts working in the fields of finance, development and investment, and trade to study patterns of governance in the emerging landscape of global-regional interlinkages.
